## DIABLO NUMISMATIC SOCIETY'S ANNUAL EXHIBIT NIGHT

The intent of Exhibit Night is for a member to create, bring to the meeting, and share either a boxed or framed Exhibit of a Numismatic area of his or her collecting interest.

1. The Exhibit should have a title and/or a brief description of what it is.
2. It should be attractively displayed.
3. It must be of a Numismatic theme of coins, currency, or medals.
4. First, Second, and Third Place plaques will be awarded to the top three entrants by a paper ballot vote from the members present. The ballot will have three spaces upon which the voting members will write the three Exhibits they liked the best. Two DNS members who have not entered an Exhibit will be the tabulators for the top three Exhibits.

Tabulation will be done by adding up the number of times an Exhibit is on the collected ballots. The Exhibit with the highest number of votes will be awarded First Place, the next numerous is awarded Second Place, and the next numerous after that is awarded third Place.

## Keeping Track of Your Coin Collection

## Dave Davis

It is important to have an accurate inventory of your coin collection, both for insurance reasons and for your heirs if you plan to leave the collection to them. It is important to record the serial numbers of your certified coins in case they are stolen.

When I moved out to California in 1965 to attend college, my dad and I started collecting coins. I did have a part-time job in the evenings and weekends so I had a little extra money for coins. I need to emphasize "little", I couldn't afford most of the coins I wanted and some of my coins needed to be purchased on lay-away. I was only making minimum wage back then ( $\$ 1.35$ per hour). We both decided that we should keep track of the date of purchase, the condition of the coin, and the cost of the coin. We wrote that information in a small notebook that I still have today.

Fast-forward 50 or so years and now I keep all of my coin information in an Excel spreadsheet. It is very easy to set up an Excel spreadsheet with any and all of the data about your coins that you want. I also transferred all the entries from the little notebook into the Excel spreadsheet.

I toyed with the idea of inserting photographs of my coins within the spreadsheet. This proved to be too cumbersome, not to mention that the spreadsheet would be over 150 pages long. I decided to keep the photos of my coins in separate binders, and the spreadsheet online.

The data I keep in my spreadsheet (illus. 1): the date of the coin, the mint mark, a description of the coin, the certification service, the serial number, the coin's condition, the retail value of the coin, the date I bought the coin, the price I paid for the coin, the gain or loss (retail minus the price paid), and any comments I might have about the coin.

I also keep each coin type in separate worksheet pages, as in illus. 2. To change the name of the worksheet tab, just click on the tab to highlight it, and then right-click and click on "rename". The name turns dark, just start typing in the new name of the tab. To add a worksheet page, click on a worksheet tab, right click, and click on insert.

## The Summary Page:

The first page of my spreadsheet is a summary. It contains each worksheet name and the totals for that worksheet. I also calculate the percentage that the worksheet page represents verses the entire coin collection. For instance: $7.94 \%$ of my total coin collection are cents (1, 2, and 3 cent coins). The summary page retrieves the totals from each worksheet page and then uses them in calculations. I have a grand total of my coin collection on the summary page.

I have written a general narrative about the collection for my heirs on the summary page.
It explains what books in my library they should read and how to identify which coins are which. "The Coin Collectors Survival Manual" by Scott Travers, "Cash In Your Coins" by Beth Diesher, "What to do with Granddaddy's Coins" by Jeff Ambio. These books give you good directions on what to do with coins you have inherited. "Making The Grade", this is a book on grading coins and it can help in coin identification. To us this may sound redundant, but to a non-coin collector it is necessary. I showed my niece a cameo proof 3-cent nickel coin and she thought it was a foreign coin. She never knew the U.S. ever had 3-cent coins. None of my heirs are coin collectors.

Since some of my coins only have bullion value, I check the Commodities page on CNN.com and enter the spot prices of gold, silver, and platinum on the summary page.

Periodically I do update the retail prices according to various price guides. I try to keep the spreadsheet current.

There are many things you can do in Excel，for instance：I have built a table of silver values as in illus．4．The silver spot price is in column $\mathbf{A}$ and the dollar value of each silver coin are in their respective columns．I increment the silver spot price by one cent in each row all the way out to $\$ 60.00$ per ounce．

I also made the same type of table for gold coin values in the next worksheet page．

## Conclusion：

You may ask why I＇m going through the trouble of trying to explain to my heirs about my coin collection when I know they are not really interested in keeping it or continuing the collection． ＂Why don＇t you just sell the coins and put the money in your retirement account＂my friends ask me．It＇s because I enjoy my coin collection，I enjoy the coin club I＇m in，and I enjoy going to coin shows and finding a new coin that really strikes my fancy．I have no plans to sell my coin collection．

I have two heirs，my sister and her daughter．I love my sister but I think she would get taken by a dealer who would make an offer that was simply too low for this collection．I am leaving this collection to my niece，I know she will do her proper research and find out（with the help of this spreadsheet）what these coins are really worth and where to sell them．Plus，in 10 to 12 years she and her husband will need money for college for their two young kids．This collection will be a big help in their education．

## Gold Karat Measurements

As a measure of purity, one carat is 24 times the purity by mass.

Historically, in England the carat was divisible into four grains, and the grain was divisible into four quarts. For example, a gold alloy of fineness (that is, $99.2 \%$ purity) could have been described as being 23 -carat, 3 -grain, 1 -quart gold.

The carat system is increasingly being complemented or superseded by the millesimal fineness system in which the purity of precious metals is denoted by parts per thousand of pure metal in the alloy.

24 carat (millesimal fineness 999 or higher)
22 carat (millesimal fineness 916)
21 carat (millesimal fineness 875)
20 carat (millesimal fineness 833)
18 carat (millesimal fineness 750)
15 carat (millesimal fineness 625)
14 carat (millesimal fineness 585)
10 carat (millesimal fineness 417)
9 carat (millesimal fineness 375 )
8 carat (millesimal fineness 333)
1 carat (millesimal fineness 042)
Carat or Karat can be spelled either way, both are correct.
