## This Month in American Coin/Currency History:

02/25/1791 – First charter date – The Bank of the United States

02/09/1793 - Congress authorized foreign coins as legal tender

02/21/1853 - \$3 gold coin approved

02/21/1857 – Flying Eagle design authorized for cent, half-cent discontinued

02/10/1870 - Carson City Mint delivers first coinage (Silver Dollars)

02/12/1873 - Coinage Act of 1873 signed by President Grant

02/28/1878 - Passage of Bland-Allison Silver Purchase Act, providing for issue of silver certificate

02/20/1895 - The Denver Mint is authorized by Congressional legislation to coin gold and silver.

02/01/1906 - Coinage operations begin at the Denver Mint.

02/05/1912 - First coinage of Nickels at Denver Mint

02/23/1915 - Congress authorizes the coinage of a McKinley commemorative gold dollar in commemoration of the erection of a memorial to the late President of the United States.

02/02/1922 - Congress authorizes the coinage of a Grant Memorial gold dollar and a Grant memorial silver dollar in commemoration of the centenary of the birth of General Ulysses S. Grant.

02/09/1924 - First National Coin Week

02/11/1964 - First coinage of Kennedy half dollars

02/14/2008 - James Monroe Dollar Coin was first released to the public.

02/28/2008 - Elizabeth Monroe coin and medal released through the First Spouse Coin and Medal Program.

02/12/2009 - United States Mint released first redesigned Lincoln One-Cent Coin in 50 years.

02/19/2009 - William Henry Harrison Presidential \$1 Golden Coin first released.

02/11/2010 - Presidential \$1 Coin Proof Set released for sale.

02/18/2010 - President Millard Fillmore Dollar Coin goes into circulation.

02/25/2010 - American Veterans Disabled for Life Silver Dollar commemorative coin released.
