April Review: “Medals & More Mare Island Collectibles” - James Kern, the Directory of the Vallejo Naval & Historical Museum. Mare Island named because General Vallejo’s mare thought to have drowned in a storm was found alive on this island. The base was founded in 1854 manned by Admiral David Farragut and closed in 1996. There are thousands of memorabilia items. One is large as a submarine to as small as a 10 cent piece. There are plaques, flags, tokens, medals, coins, buttons, patches and the list goes on.

Trivia Question – Why is there a mint mark on coins? Jeff Brody won a Silver Eagle for correctly answering that it was done to correctly weigh the silver or gold content of a coin.

05/16/1866 – Shield nickel authorized

05/18/1875 – Philadelphia Mint strikes first 20-cent coins

05/18/1908 – Congressional legislation restores the motto, "In God We Trust" to the coins of the United States.

05/20/1911 – First coinage of cents at Denver

05/22/2000 – Carolina State quarter released

05/21/2001 – Rhode Island State quarter released

05/20/2002 – Louisiana State quarter released

05/17/2007 – John Adams Dollar Coin was released into circulation

05/15/2008 – John Quincy Adams Dollar Coin was first released to the public

05/29/2008 – Louisa Adams coin and medal released through the First Spouse Coin and Medal Program

05/14/2009 – Mint released second redesigned Lincoln One-Cent Coin.
